The Homework Advantage: Boosting Success at our school - a request for your feedback

Homework often sparks debate (too much, too little etc.), but research consistently highlights its crucial role in secondary education. Well-designed homework assignments significantly contribute to student achievement and the development of essential life skills.



Studies show that regular, relevant homework reinforces classroom learning, helping students solidify their understanding of complex concepts. It provides opportunities for independent practice, which is vital for mastery and retaining information long-term. Homework

cultivates discipline, time management, and problem-solving abilities – skills invaluable for future studies and careers. It also encourages responsibility and self-reliance, empowering our students to take ownership of their learning.

Year 12

Year 12 targets are currently being set based on prior attainment, national benchmarks and staff insight. These will be released as part of the Year 12 Interim package on 26th November.

All targets are set at an realistically aspirational level in order to push our students to achieve their best. They are not set in stone and can change as each student works their way through their course, evidencing their achievement and potential through classwork and assessments.

Year 13

Year 13 have just completed their first round of mock exams for this year and have certainly hit the ground running with their focus and preparation. The results for this mock exam season will be published as part of the Year 13 Interim package on 26th November. This will provide an opportunity for every student to recognise their current performance so they can use their study time in a focused way ahead of the next set of mock exams and, ultimately, their final exams.

There will also be a Year 13 Parents' Evening on 27th November where results, strengths and weaknesses can be discussed and clear actions for success implemented!





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

Year 10

Year 10 targets were sent home this week.

Our Year 10 team have been working exceptionally hard to ensure that Year 10 targets support students in recognising and ultimately achieving their potential. They are based on prior attainment, staff insight, and national benchmarks. They are a motivational guide, not a fixed prediction.

Aspirational targets are not permanent. They will be **regularly reviewed** during the academic year to ensure they remain realistically ambitious, and appropriate for each student. As teachers gather more evidence of progress, some targets may be refined accordingly.

We encourage you to speak with your child about their targets and how they can stay focused, organised, and committed to achieving their best possible outcomes.

Assessments, reports and points of contact at Key Stage 3

Parents and students in years 7,8 and 9 recently received their first interim report. Later in the year when students have covered more curriculum content, we will report subject specific bandings, telling you how your child is progressing in relation to their potential. This will be the basis for the second interim report in the spring term.

At the start of this term, Heads of Year at our information evenings outlined a package of events and home contact points, designed in consultation with our parent forum groups last year. We have aimed to spread these events out, so there are at least two points of contact each term.



Things to look out for in the next few months include:

Interim Report 2.

In term 2 we will report on individual subject performance and bandings, alongside an update on approach to learning, attendance, and behaviour/ achievement points. Year 7 and 8 interim reports are published on 12th February, and Year 9 on 16th January.

Showcase evenings in year 7 and 8.



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Upholding Our Standards: The Path to Success

As we move through the term, we want to share a key message that has been reinforced with all students this week: the ongoing importance of high standards in all aspects of school life.

Through assemblies this week we have reinforced three key areas: **Preparation for Learning**, **Attitude to Learning**, and **Ready for Learning**. By focusing on these areas, we hope to encourage every student to maximize their potential and achieve success.

1 Preparing for Learning: Start Strong!

The foundation of a great school day is being prepared. We are urging all students to focus on two essential elements:

- Punctuality: Being on time for school and for every single lesson demonstrates respect for both their own learning and that of their classmates and teachers. A prompt start ensures students don't miss crucial instructions at the beginning of the lesson.
- **Uniform:** Wearing the correct school uniform completely and smartly sets a professional tone for the day. It removes distractions, fosters a sense of belonging, and shows that students are ready to work.

2 Attitude to Learning: Aiming for Excellence

A positive attitude is the driving force behind academic progress. We encourage all students to strive for the highest possible Attitude to Learning (ATL) grades.

Our focus is on students consistently achieving **Grade 1** or **Grade 2** in their ATL scores. These grades reflect students who are:

- Engaged in their learning: Actively participating in discussions and challenging themselves with new
 concents
- Working Hard: Putting in consistent effort both in class and with homework.
- Taking Pride in their Work: Ensuring all submissions are neatly presented, carefully completed, and reflect their best effort.

3 Ready for Learning: Every Second Counts

Once in the classroom, the priority is to make every moment count. **Being ready for learning** means eliminating distractions and being immediately focused.

- **Punctuality (In-Lesson):** Arriving at the lesson on time and quickly settling down with the necessary equipment is key.
- Every Second Counts: From the moment the bell rings until the end of the lesson, students should be fully engaged in the task at hand. This means listening carefully to instructions, transitioning quickly between activities, and using the full allotted time for productive work.

We recognise and truly appreciate the vital role our parents and carers play in reinforcing these high expectations at home.

Thank you for your ongoing support in ensuring your child is **punctual**, **wearing the correct uniform**, and approaching their studies with a **positive attitude**. This strong school-home partnership is what makes a genuine difference in student success and helps create an environment where every student can thrive



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


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Excellence in STEM:

How Holmes Chapel is opening doors for STEM students

As your children move through the school, their focus shifts not just to exam success, but to standing out in an increasingly competitive landscape, whether applying to top universities or seeking competitive apprenticeships. We offer our Year 12 and 13 students various core enrichment pathways designed to ensure they are ready for life after school. Our STEM (Science, Technology [Computer Science], Engineering and Maths) students a pathway where they will gain an additional Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) that is focussed on Cyber Security and we support this with a range of real-world STEM

engagement opportunities (which we also make available to some of the promising students in Year 10 and Year 11).

Gaining a professional edge to enter the world of cyber-security

We encourage our STEM students to develop an interests around both computer science and engineering by exploring the *Cyber Security EPQ*, which is endorsed by the Chartered Institute of Information Security (CIISec). This qualification is an investment in their future as well as gaining valuable UCAS points. We are also the only provider in the local area to offer this particular course.

Unlike standard coursework, the EPQ allows students to conduct university-level research into a topic of their choosing, such as data privacy or ethical hacking. This independent process cultivates advanced research skills and critical thinking, demonstrating a genuine, self-directed passion for a field that is shaping our modern economy and is likely to be a key part of our national security in an increasingly uncertain geopolitical world.

The EPQ carries the equivalent UCAS tariff of half an A-Level. Success here—especially achieving a top grade—can significantly strengthen university applications, often resulting in lower conditional offers from highly selective Russell Group institutions. By choosing a their CIISec approved project, students ensure their work is professionally relevant, giving them a meaningful head start over their peers in other local schools and colleges.

Building Confidence, presentation and leadership skills

Success on our STEM pathway is about more than just grades; it's about character and communication. Part of the broader course involves engagement with local primary schools, where our Year 12 students' work with local primary pupils and teach them to code on Microbits. This is part of building a strong future pathway of STEM students for local business. Crucially, we are encouraging local and national, business leaders/doctors and those involved in STEM fields to come in and explain to our students what working in their industry entails. This provides the perfect platform for building their understanding and links into these local employment opportunities. When our students mentor younger pupils, for example by teaching them coding principles using Micro:bits, they refine vital soft skills. They must be patient, clear, and communicative, transforming abstract concepts into understandable lessons. This leadership and communication practice is invaluable, regardless of the career path they choose.

Furthermore, our program connecting students directly with local STEM leaders, including Vets, engineers, business CEOs and doctors. These talks move learning beyond textbooks, offering a crucial window into how science, technology, and math are applied in diverse, professional settings. This exposure helps our students make informed decisions about their university courses and provides early networking insights, actively helping them map out their future careers with confidence.



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School Uniform Consultation

Over the coming weeks we intend to launch a full review of school uniform and dress code. This is an important process aimed at ensuring that our uniform is fully compliant with all current national guidance and is fit for purpose for a modern, progressive secondary school environment.

The last time we conducted a uniform consultation was just over three years ago. Although this led to a decision not to make significant changes to the uniform, we believe that this is something that should be reviewed regularly.



The review will focus on making sure our current uniform and dress code:

- Meets all required national standards and guidance.
- Is practical and affordable for our children and families.
- Reflects the needs of today's learning environment.

We believe that a well-designed uniform fosters a sense of community, equality, and pride, as well as being conducive to effective learning habits both in and out of the classroom. We are keen to hear your views on how we can best achieve this.

The consultation will run over the next few weeks, giving everyone time to share their thoughts and suggestions. The intention is to complete the consultation by Christmas, and following this, we aim to be able to communicate the results and any changes to our uniform during the Spring Term, ensuring that all stakeholders have time to prepare for any changes that may result.

We are keen to get the views of all stakeholders; students, parents, staff and Governors, to ensure that this process is as effective and informative as possible.

Further details on the survey, including how you can contribute will follow in the next couple of weeks.

As you will know, this coming Sunday is Remembrance Sunday, where as a nation, we remember those who have lost their lives during the conflicts that Britain has been involved in during the last 100 years or more. During the course of the next week at HCCS, we will be engaging with the Remembrance theme through a number of activities and events, to ensure that our learners get the best possible chance to reflect on its important messages.

- On Thursday and Friday this week, members of our Youth Council group have visited form groups selling poppies as part of the national Poppy Appeal
- Members of the Youth Council will also be attending the Remembrance services in Holmes Chapel this coming Sunday
- On both Monday 10th and Tuesday 11th November, we will be including some activities in form time associated with the Remembrance and Armistice theme, as part of our combined 'Thought for the Week' and Personal Development programme
- Our House assemblies next week will also include some focus on the Armistice theme





This is a fantastic achievement, proving their dedication and hard work of our students. To have read over one million words already is a spectacular milestone.


Book Recommendations


Non-Fiction books are a great way to engage readers and bring information alive. Below are some of our favourite Non-Fiction texts which are sure to engage a variety of teenage readers.

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
