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Dear all

On Friday 17th October, here at our school we will be affirming our commitment to anti racism and taking part in 'wear-red' day. This is a day when students will be invited, if they wish, to wear one item of red clothing with their uniform. You will be able to read the details of what this means in practice including what is acceptable and not acceptable to wear later on in this newsletter but to be clear, the 17th of October is NOT a non uniform day.

An anti racist approach underpins the core values that define our school: Belonging, learning, pride and ambition. Over the last few years, we have grown in diversity at a school and have a greater number of children and families from diverse backgrounds than ever before. We celebrate this rich diversity within our school,



recognising that it is a key driver in our understanding of the different cultures and heritage that we are all part of. 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Curriculum Matters

Homework and Satchel One

We have been pleased with the roll out of Satchel One so far. A number of parents have been in touch with us to let us know how much simpler it is to see what homework their children are being set.

We are also really grateful to those parents who have contacted us to tell us when it's NOT working as it should. This tends to be where some teachers are setting homework on Google Classroom, but this is not linking to Satchel One. We are working through this list of teachers and aim to have every class linked by the end of next week.

A number of students have not yet downloaded the Satchel App to help them monitor their homework. To support those students who have a phone to do this, on

Monday morning, in tutor time, form tutors will help students to download and log into the app. If your child does not have a phone, then they (and you) can monitor Satchel One via the web browser.

Here is a link to a guide that we have put together that explains how to setup the app. Click here.

We have picked up on some specific teething issues with the app for students. This is a particular problem on Android phones where parents have enabled Family Link - so it is most likely to affect students in Years 7-9. To solve the problem students will need to access Satchel through the web browser instead of the app. They can follow the link on the student section of our website and then use the log in with Google option. The browser version works well on mobile devices providing a similar experience to the app.

We also know that some parents haven't yet accessed the Satchel One app or website. If you still need to do this, we emailed you the log in details you need in the middle of September - please check and use this information. If you are having any problems with logging in, then we have a dedicated e-mail address for such problems - please message satchel@hccs.info and a member of our IT support team will be in touch with you.

Raising Attainment Focus

Supporting our students in Key Stage 4

We are looking forward to seeing Year 11 parents - and, importantly, students - at our online parents' evening next Thursday. We have chosen an early date to make sure that our students have hit the ground running - and parents will receive interim grades on Wednesday to support the process.

The parents' evening is the first stage in our support programme for students. After the evening and in the run up to mocks, students will fall into 3 tiers of support:

- Those who have already shown they can study and revise independently. These students will be able to work effectively at home, following the guidance of their class teachers completing both homework and revision.
- Those who need support with independent work. These students will need to access our additional study base provision (Mon-weds after school), to help them to follow their teachers' guidance.
- Those who need additional intervention at this stage to plug gaps in their learning from Year 10 or earlier, particularly in English and maths at this stage.





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
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Mr Sneddon will write home with guidance about this with the interims and the support programme will evolve as the year goes on, with our second phase beginning after the mock examinations.

Miss Connolly has been delighted with attendance at the Year 10 study sessions - each week so far we have had a large number of students stay after school to complete revision tasks or homework on a Thursday. These students have clearly started their GCSE and BTEC courses with real ambition - we are very proud of them.




Model United Nations Launches at HCCS

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
Music Performance Tour Paris July 2026

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Former Holmes Chapel GCSE student with a £66k per year scholarship to Eton

At Holmes Chapel we aim to challenge and extend all our students. A couple of years ago, the local press published an article on GCSE results day about Oliver Furgala. Oliver sat his GCSE in Computer Science at the end of Year 9 and had achieved a grade 9. We are used to seeing great results from Year 11 students, but it is unusual for a pupil to do that well at such an early age in a difficult academic subject. In the summer, the Northwich Guardian published another article about his next step.

Oliver commuted to the school everyday from Crewe, because his parents believed he would excel at HCCS. His final GCSE results had him achieving almost all grade nines in his 11 GCSEs. During his GCSE years, in Computer Science, he studied for the A Level. He was keen to explore where he should go for his GCE and beyond. He had targeted some courses at prestigious universities and concluded that the school with the greatest number of successful applicants was Eton. I encouraged him to take a chance on applying to Eton. Oliver submitted his application via the school's website, successfully getting the usual \$400 application fee waived. The application process was rigorous, culminating in a three-day visit for Oliver and his mum. This included six interviews with teachers of his A-level subjects and three separate entrance exams. "The interviewers were really nice and supportive," Oliver recalled. "They wanted to see my strengths, not expose my weaknesses."



Oliver was successful in gaining the highly sought-after Orwell Award at the \$66,000-a-year boarding school in Windsor. Eton is renowned globally as the place where royalty, aristocracy, and the business elite send their male heirs to be moulded into future leaders. Its alumni list reads like a who's who of British power and culture, including Princes William and Harry, former Prime Ministers David Cameron and Boris Johnson, and actors Eddie Redmayne and Tom Hiddleston. The scholarship is named after one of its famous former students, the writer George Orwell. The Orwell Award is granted to just 12 sixth-form applicants each year who demonstrate strong academic potential but would not otherwise have the opportunity to attend a top-tier independent school. He invited me down last year to see him at Eton, where he was competing for the college in the world famous Wall Game. For Oliver, the experience has been transformative.

"One of the biggest advantages of being here is the scope your mind is exposed to," Oliver shared. "Some of the people here are just so inspiring. You see what you want to be more like, and you try to improve yourself." While the academic demands increased, Oliver sees the challenge as a positive force that's helping him get more out of his A-Level subjects: history, physics, and maths. "Academically, it has been a huge leap up," he admitted. "But I've reflected on it, and I think it's a good thing. The expectations are very high, but it shapes you as a human being. You learn to hold yourself to a higher standard."

The scholarship comes with certain expectations, and Oliver has thrown himself into the Eton experience. Outside of his studies, he has embraced the school's staggering offering of extracurricular activities, including rowing and learning to play the organ. "Rowing is pretty big commitment," he explained. "It's pretty much every day after lessons... You get on your bike and cycle to Dorney Lake, which is owned by the school. We have it all to ourselves." With another year left at Eton, Oliver's long-term sights are set high. "The dream is to go to Oxford," he stated. "I will have to work hard and see what happens."

He's embracing the competitive environment, finding that the hard work actually makes him enjoy his subjects more. "It's very cool to do really hard things, get through them, and flourish. It's really rewarding."

Caydee's hard work will create a lasting benefit for hundreds of current and future students. The £1,048 she raised will be used to create a much-needed SEN Nurture Area at Wimboldsley Community Primary school, a dedicated space designed to especially benefit children with the greatest needs.

But her involvement doesn't end there! Caydee has already started working with the school to help design the nurture area, is planning to paint a mural inside, and will even be cutting the ribbon at the grand opening. Caydee wanted to show others that if you are really determined to do something, you can. We are incredibly proud of your achievement and the wonderful gift you have given to the students and staff at Wimboldsley Community Primary School.

Girl overcomes odds in swim for school

A MIDDLEWICH schoolgirl with several serious conditions is showing support for her primary school by swimming for more than a mile.

Caydee Darlington has autism, ADHD, chronic fatigue and other conditions like Chiari Brain Malformation and Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome.

The 11-year-old, from Leighton, is in year six at Wimboldsley Primary School where she and others with special educational needs thrive under a teaching team which is outstanding according to Ofsted.

At the end of the school year she is on the way to Holmes Chapel High School but she is showing support for her primary school by swimming for more than a mile.

This is something she wanted to do but she was unable to do for a long time, in particular after two bouts of coronavirus two years ago worsened the chronic fatigue.

Mum Jody Darlington said: "At

one point she was sleeping for 16 hours to 20 hours a day and any activity went out the window. She was not able to do much at all and she was on a part-time timetable at pri-

mary school."

"She wanted to do it so badly before the end of primary school and it has become imperative to her to say 'I'll do it now, 'I'll do it now,' and her

health has had a bit of a boost with the warmer weather as it always does."

Caydee is already over a mile and she is setting her sights on two miles at Weaverham Community Pool before the end of the school year.

It is an amazing achievement for a part-time wheelchair user who was non-verbal until the age of five but is now 'smart' and 'switched on'.

Ms Darlington said: "She doesn't complain, doesn't cry and doesn't like to be treated any differently. She says whatever is wrong with you, you can do the same as everyone else.

"She says she wants to leave a legacy to tell the other children, no matter where you are now, there is no telling where you will be in five years' time and to dream big and to do it."

Caydee's sponsored swim is up to a total of more than £700 out of a target of £500 at the time of writing on JustGiving.

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Supporting Parents and Carers



Connected Conversation Appointments

The Educational Psychology (EP) Service is offering appointments for parents and carers at Cheshire East Family Hubs, held every half term in both North and South localities. These informal sessions are an opportunity to discuss concerns, seek advice and explore strategies to support your child or young person. Our focus areas are Cognition and Learning and SEMH (Social, Emotion and Mental Health) needs. They are not sessions for local authority processes (e.g. EHCPs or placement changes) or child assessments.

Examples of Topics include:

- Literacy, Maths or Executive Function difficulties
- Anxiety or school related issues
- Play, social skills or friendship needs
- Transitions and/or difficulties with change/loss
- Preparing for Adulthood
