What does the course involve?

- Study of the target language culture and language
- Using language imaginatively and creatively. Students at this level are expected to cope with a greater degree of unpredictability and deal with a widening range of potential problems.
- Using a variety of authentic materials in the target language, such as course books, newspaper articles, TV, podcasts, websites and software packages in school.
- Working independently using many of these resources at home.
- Aiming towards a good knowledge of the written and spoken language and a sound grasp of basic grammar.
- Participating orally in classwork.
- Working towards a wide-ranging vocabulary to cope successfully with a variety of everyday situations.
- Translating to and from the target language.

Further Study/Employment Prospects

- The course will equip you fully for beginning study of the language at 'A' Level.
- There are full language degrees for careers that involve languages, and also combined degrees with virtually any other subject, eg. Accountancy, Law, Business Studies, ICT and Engineering.
- Business is not the only area of employment where language competencies are needed. Multiple government agencies, the Travel Industry, Engineering, Communications, the field of Education, International Law, Economics, Public policy, Publishing, advertising, Entertainment, Scientific research and a broad array of service sectors all have needs for people with foreign language skills.
- Transferable skills are desirable in an increasingly global job market and a qualification in a foreign language is seen as a reliable indicator of an ability to cope with intellectual demands.

Skills you will develop

- Key communication skills, including the use of formal and informal register.
- Time management.
- Memory skills.
- Group work and participation.
- Confidence in coping with unfamiliar people and situations.

Subject Combinations

Study of a language combines well with a range of different subjects. For example:

- Humanities, English and Psychology - study of culture and improved understanding of grammar, sentence structure, and effective writing
- Maths and Science - ability to spot and apply patterns
- Performing Arts - confidence speaking in front of others
- Business - languages are valued in business careers
- Art and DT - increased creativity and wider cultural awareness/inspiration
- Food - wider awareness of Spanish and Latin American cuisine
