Drama	Let Him Have It - A Case of British Injustice - exploring the case of Derek Bentey through devised performance. Students will utilise the facts surrounding the case to inform their work. RS	We have started a brand new module which mirrors the theological and philosophical approach of the ALevel. We have asked the question "Does God Exist" and we will examine the evidence both for and against God's existence, encouraging students to have both an enquiring and critical mind. Within this 'evidence' we explore the cosmological and teleological arguments, assessing rebuttals from Darwin and modern day science. We look at the evidence from religious experience and miracles, near death experiences and conversion. Moving forward after this we will be looking at a more ethical approach to R.S, through social justice issues such as poverty and wealth.	An end of topic exam. Mid point progress task Recall checks every lesson - for this we strongly encourage students to utilise the knowledge organisers provided for them.

In the coming weeks, you can support your child in a number of ways:

- ★ Check that your child is keeping up with their homework, this will be set through the Google Classroom and will include a clear deadline.
- ★ Use the Google Classroom to check that your child has what they need in their book, you can sit together and go through the lessons to see that they finished the work
- ★ Speak to your child about what they are doing this could be through asking them what they have done and what knowledge they can remember from the lesson.
- ★ Encourage your child to read for pleasure and ensure they always have their book with them in school for our 5 minutes reading time at the start of every lesson.
- ★ Ensure that they have regular breaks from homework and get a good night's sleep work in chunks of time, turn off mobile phones and devices at least one hour in advance of going to bed
- ★ Encourage hobbies and interests which are not technology based
- ★ Let children be bored; this is when creativity occurs and reveals their talents
