Author Visits







DJ Cook and H.A.Robinson

This year's Literature Festival kicked off in style on Monday 4th March with an author visit from co-writers DJ Cook and H.A. Robinson. They hosted an engaging assembly for our Year 8 and 9 students where they reflected on a number of important messages such as resilience and identity. This was followed by a Meet the Authors/Book Signing in the LRC. It was great to see students from Year 7 through to Year 11 engaging in the session, asking for tips and tricks to help them along the way with their own writing. It was certainly evident that HCCS has a selection of upcoming authors that we need to look out for in the future!

Clare Littlemore

On the second day of our Literature Festival, we were treated to a visit from dystopian author Clare Littlemore. Clare joined us to host a two hour workshop for a number of our KS4 students. Clare's workshops covered a number of topics such as 'How to create a gripping dystopian novel' and 'How to navigate the publishing world'. It was really interesting to hear about Clare's journey of self publishing, showing our students that there are lots of paths that can be taken to become a successful writer. All students were welcome to the LRC at breaktime, to meet Clare and ask any questions which they might have. Again, it was great to see how many students took the time to come and meet Clare, and take the opportunity to introduce themselves and ask questions.









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Lis Jardine

We closed our Literature Festival with a final author visit from Lis Jardine. Lis hosted an engaging assembly with our Year 7 students where she introduced the characters of her book 'The Detention Detectives', her life and how she became a published author. Students engaged in a Q&A session where they asked some fantastic questions about subjects such as overcoming writer's block and how authors create engaging characters. Following the assembly, all students were again invited to the LRC to meet Lis.

Overall it was great to see how many students engaged with the author visits. Author visits allow schools to bring characters to life, and our students are let into the authors' secrets with added tips and tricks. They are full of book recommendations, overflowing enthusiasm, writing ideas and encouragement to keep trying. Students learn about real-life stories of where individuals have been met with rejection and not given up. An important message for us all.

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


Year 9 – Jeffrey Boakye

Jeffrey is an ex-teacher turned writer known for weaving together complex issues of our time in an accessible and engaging way. With a particular focus on issues surrounding race and masculinity. Our Year 9 students were introduced to Jefrey's book 'Musical Truth: A musical journey through modern black Britain' inviting students to think about and reconsider events they may or may not have learned about in school through a thrilling and musical journey.

The event celebrated authors Jasmine Richards and Sabine Adeyinka, who shared their journeys into bookmaking, highlighting the artistry of book creatives from under-represented communities and backgrounds. We were also extremely lucky to win 50 copies of the two books 'The Unmorrow Curse' by Jasmine Richards and 'Jummy at the River School' by Sabine Adeyinka, which meant each student who took part was able to take a copy of each book home with them. 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
